**Main Findings: Survey of Arab society
on entrepreneurship in Israel**

Survey methodology



- N = 500 Arab respondents ages 17- 60
- Telephone interviews, in Arabic
- Margin of error: +/- 4.4 %
- Data collection: New Wave Research
- Dates of data collection: 22-28 February, 2016
- Survey design and analysis: Dr. Dahlia Scheindlin

Methodology of the omnibus:



- N = 505 Adult Jewish Israelis
- Internet omnibus survey, in Hebrew
- Margin of error: +/- 4.4 %
- Data collection: New Wave Research
- Dates of data collection: May 2, 2016
- Survey design and analysis: Dr. Dahlia Scheindlin

Field of study




- Top response: Science (**38%**) – high potential for high-tech startups
- All responses with potential for hi-tech/ entrepreneurship (Science, Health, Management, Medicine, Law): **61%**



Among respondents with higher education – over half are in fields related to hi-tech (listed above)

What is your main reason for working?



Over three-quarters (77%) are motivated by self-fulfillment


Jewish respondents:

- 12% Main goal of work is just to earn (survival)
- 66% Earn and fulfill my skills/interests
- 13% First fulfill skills/interests, then earn as a result
- 8% Reach the top

Should parents direct their children's career choices?



Parents should actively direct their children's career choices: **12%**




Children should make their own career choices: **83%**



Parents strive to give their children independence in career choices

Have you heard of hi-tech entrepreneurship?



Nearly six in ten people have not even heard of hi-tech entrepreneurship/start ups


Jewish respondents:

Heard	87%
Not heard	13%

Do you know anyone who works in hi-tech or start-ups?



Met someone once OR knows someone personally OR works personally in this field:
20%





Don't know anyone:

A majority have no personal contact with anyone working in the field and no experience with anyone. Only 20% have personal contact with someone in the field. (In comparison, over twice as many Jewish individuals have personal contacts.)


Jewish respondents:
DO know someone personally: **43%**
Don't know anyone: **57%**

Should Arab society get more involved in entrepreneurship, or is it too risky?



Nearly half agree it's important to get more involved in the field – the remainder are unfamiliar but not against it

What are the best reasons to go into hi-tech entrepreneurship?




Working independently is very attractive (speculation from the MasarUp Council: Arabs have experienced the glass ceiling as hired employees)

Additional finding: Among those who have heard of hi-tech or know someone in the field, “tech innovation” is the top answer

Jewish respondents:	
Work independently	5%
Tech innovation, solve problems	37%
Make money	34%
Innovation generates leadership	13% (11% among Arabs)

What are the main reasons NOT to go into hi-tech entrepreneurship?




Lack of experience, familiarity, networks to raise money are all significant - but the desire to maintain a "traditional life" in their local towns is barely a factor

Is there discrimination against different populations in Israel on a professional level?



Yes: **73%**

(55% agree “strongly”
+ 18% somewhat)



No: **22%**




Additional finding: Discrimination in professional life is felt by most, but is at greater levels among those with higher education, or with more exposure to entrepreneurship - or their awareness of it is greater

Jewish respondents:

71% agree there is discrimination (**28%** “strongly” + **43%** “somewhat”)
Much lower intensity than for Arabs

What is your main professional obstacle?



- Discrimination: **27% (top response)**
- Lack of resources in Arab towns: **23%**
- Other responses: **14%**
- All of the above: **18%**
